Brief Overview of Water Board Permits

- State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB)
- Nine Regional Water Quality Control Boards (RWQCB)
- Construction, Industrial and Municipal General Permits
- > Reissued every five-years
- Under SWRCB permits schools are seen as "nontraditional" municipal entities
- Schools first proposed to be regulated under Municipal permit in 2002



Municipal General Storm Water Permit (MS4)

- > Under current MS4 schools are not "designated"
- School required to follow Best Management Practices (BMP) and complete Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP)
- > The revised permit proposed much more stringent requirements
- Schools subject to the new requirements under the first iteration of the permit



School Community Advocacy Effort

- > C.A.S.H. Storm Water Subcommittee
- > Los Angeles County of Education
- > San Diego County Office of Education



School Argument

- > MS4 cannot afford new state requirements
- MS4 poses unique challenges for compliance as new construction and modernization project must gain approval from multiple state agencies
- MS4 adds COST and COMPLEXITY to school building and modernization projects
- > Worked extensively with SWRCB staff to address concerns



How Are Schools Treated Under Proposed MS4?

- Schools are "not-designated" under the permit
- Schools are still subject to regional board authority and can designate schools on a case-by-case basis
- > Not an "exemption" for schools



County Offices of Education

- COEs were not initially included in the school non-designation permit language
- > Worked with SWRCB staff and determined the omission was a technical oversight
- The non-designation language now includes COEs
